The Drug Lady: A Medical Marijuana Discussion

Lynn Reimer

President, ACT on Drugs, Inc



An overview of what has changed over the years when marijuana first became legal to the place where we are now. Lynn will touch on what has had to change with response and safety of our First Responders and the general public with this old drug now being so easily accessible.

Lynn Reimer has a BS in Chemistry and Biology, and is an internationally recognized speaker, trainer and advocate on issues relating to substance abuse. Lynn is president of ACT on Drugs, Inc., a non-profit organization with a mission to educate parents, teens, and professionals about addictive and psychoactive substances, both legal and illegal, which are available in their community. With her in depth chemistry knowledge of drugs, having served with DEA and on the North Metro Drug Task Force, and her engaging style she brings a real, personal, and vivid face to the issues presented by illicit drug use. Over the past 20 years, Lynn has spoken regularly with students, school staff, parents, communities, companies, and governmental agencies about drug awareness, recognition, and prevention.

Surviving the Four Winds of Disaster During the Marshall Wildfire & Lessons Learned

Mike Chard, *Director, Office of Disaster Management for the City of Boulder & Boulder County*



This presentation covers different segments of the disaster using the metaphor of the “Four Winds” to tell the story and within each segment shares the successes and lessons learned. The presentation content focuses on the response and incident management environment, EOC operations, alert and warning, mass care, multi-agency coordination, policy group management,

recovery and the after action process and why it is so important.

Mike Chard has a Bachelors in Fire Service Administration, Bachelors Organizational Development, Masters Management Sciences & Organizational Leadership. Certified State Emergency Manager, FEMA certified Master Exercise Program Planner and FEMA certified Instructor specializing in Incident Command and Emergency Operation Centers

He has 14 years as the Director of Disaster Management for the City of Boulder and Boulder County, 27 years in the fire service retiring at the level of Fire Chief and Colorado Emergency Management Association Vice President 2011-13, CEMA President from 2014 to 2018.

Disaster experience includes managing response and recovery to floods, tornados, wildfires, cyber-attacks, and the most notable are 2010 Fourmile wildland fire, 2013 Colorado flooding, 2015 Tornado, 2016 Cold Springs Wildfire, COVID 19 Pandemic, 2020 Calwood Wildfire, 2021 Boulder mass shooting, 2021 Marshall fire and 2022 NCAR fire.

Seven Minutes and 17 Seconds – The Fire and EMS Response to the Marjory Stoneman Douglas School Terrorist Incident

John Whalen, *Deputy Fire Chief, Coral Spring Fire Dept*
Ryan Gallagher, *Deputy Chief at Coral Springs Police Dept*



The communities of Coral Springs and Parkland were impacted by the ninth deadliest mass shooting event in U.S. history and the third deadliest school shooting to date when a shooter entered Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School and opened fire with a long rifle. Within approximately 7 minutes, 34 people were killed or injured. Lesson Learned from the response and top takeaways. In addition to the Parkland

shooting, eight Coral Springs-Parkland firefighters helped to find survivors in Surfside building collapse amid the broken concrete and debris in the 12-story partially collapsed residential building. Recognizing the ongoing stress a MCI has on the first responders and addressing mental health immediately.

Chief Whalen has been in the fire service since 1993 and has held nearly every position including EMS Director and Special Operations Division Head. Chief Whalen holds multiple degrees related to the Fire and Emergency Medical Services programs. He has been an instructor at the Coral Springs Regional Institute of Public Safety since 2000 and helped develop their Emergency Medical Technician Program and was selected by former Fire Chief Frank Babinec to be Interim Fire Chief in December 2019 when Chief Babinec began his role as City Manager. After outstanding service to the department in this planned temporary role, he was promoted to Deputy Fire Chief in February 2020.

He holds certifications in multiple disciplines including Hazardous Materials Technician, Dive Rescue Specialist and was formerly assigned as a SWAT Medic for the Coral Springs Police Department. Chief Whalen has worked in the area of Health and Safety Officer and is the co-chair of the sub-committee for Safety and Health for the Fire Chiefs Association of Broward County, as well as the Interim Chair of the State Section on Safety and Health following Chief Babinec's departure from that role.

Deputy Chief Ryan Gallagher currently oversees the Operations Division of the Coral Springs Police Department, including the supervision of the Patrol Unit, Traffic Unit, the Special Operations Component, and the Criminal Investigations Component of the Coral Springs Police Department. In 2002, Gallagher was sworn in as a law enforcement officer with the Coral Springs Police Department and has since held several leadership positions.

In August of 2017, he was promoted to the rank of Captain. As a Captain he supervised the Special Operations Component. This responsibility included the supervision of the SET Unit, K-9 Unit, BEAR Unit, Bikes and Intelligence Unit, and Humane Unit. He also has served as a Field Training Officer, Citizen's Police Academy Instructor, and a Response to Resistance Board member. In June of 2018, he was transferred to supervise the Criminal Investigations Component of the Coral Springs Police Department. This assignment included the supervision of the General Investigations Unit, Economic Crimes Unit, Special Investigations Unit, Crimes Against Persons Unit, Crime Scene Unit, and the dive team.

Deputy Chief Ryan Gallagher graduated from Kean University with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Criminal Justice and a master's degree in Criminology from Florida State University.

Sibley Train Derailment

When a bridge collapsed in the Northwest Iowa town of Sibley, it caused a 47-car train to derail resulting in a diesel fuel fire. 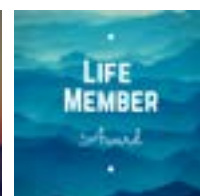
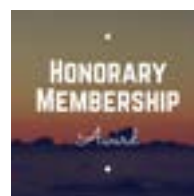
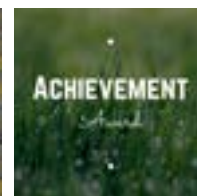
